For a while it looked like halfback Delbert Thomas wouldn't be able to play the rest of the year, much less break the JC individual rushing record. He suffered an ankle injury in early October and chances were slim that Delbert could break Charlie Brown's record of 2,323 total yards.

In the last two remaining games of the season, Thomas recovered and rushed for 149 and 177 yards respectively. In the final game he was only 15 yards short of the single game rushing record when he sprained his knee in the third quarter, but he didn't quit.

With the help of his teammates, Thomas was able to break the JC Career Rushing Record with a total of 2,403 yards.

## Valuable to Students

The Work Study Program was set up by the Missouri Department of Education in order to help the Special Education student. The program provides educational and vocational services for secondary level students from 16 years of age. The leadership of the program is provided by the Vocational Adjustment Coordinator, who is appointed by the school board. Vocational Adjustment Coordinators for JC are Mrs. Virginia Malone and Mrs. Wanda Zimmerman.

The Vocational Rehabilitation Section offers services including (a) medical evaluation along with follow-up medical services, (b) work potential evaluation, job goal guidance, and counseling, (c) job placement and follow-up supervision, (d) occupational tools, equipment, and licenses, (e) vocational training including provision for tuition, fees, books, supplies, maintenance, and transportation to and from trade or commercial schools.

The student-worker is scheduled into select regular classes. He is also to be involved in most normal school activities. A student may also audit (that is, to sit in on regular sessions of special interest to them) classes not in their schedule. A class in Job Readiness is also taken to prepare the student to cope with practical aspects of his future placement in the open job market.
