I cannot wait, I cannot wait, Here is my life, I want to live it, Here is my life, I want to give it, serving my fellow man, Here is my life, Here is my life.







# Fall play utilizes blackout technique

"Flowers for Algernon", the fall play was completely unique from past years' plays in the sense that no background was used. Unlike the elaborate backdrops traditionally used, the whole play was done in blackout fashion. Settings were dependent upon a few props, the imagination of the audience, and the creativity of the actors.

The story centers around Charlie, a mentally retarded young man who undergoes an operation by Dr. Strauss and Professor Nemer and becomes a genius. Charlie falls in love with his teacher, Alice, but his past haunts him whenever he is with her.

Charlie strongly identifies with Algernon, the lab mouse who underwent a similar operation. Charlie's progress is always compared to Algernon's. When Algernon returns to normal and dies, Charlie senses the same fate for himself.







#### Backstage — hard work, little glamour



Onstage glamour from the costumes, acting, and music is usually what the audiences see and will remember, but the glitter does not suddenly appear opening night. It is the result of hours of sweat and hard labor.

The scenery which transported spectators to Heidelberg was the effort of the stage craft class. As the curtain closed, prop changers swooped in to change the inn into a castle or ballroom. These kids had to know which props were needed and when. Stage managers called the actors in for their scenes. Stationed backstage was the rope crew who pulled the curtains and positioned backdrops. Spotlights and the sound equipment required the attentions of conscientious operators too.

All costuming had to be provided by the students themselves. This put many girls, mothers, and neighbors behind sewing machines. Home Ec students made the student's caps for the boys. Finalizing the transformation was the application of stage make-up which was done by another committee of students.

"The Student Prince" didn't just involve the learning of lines and music — it was the product of many unseen and unrecognized people.







#### **AFS hosts State Convention**

The American Field Service presents an opportunity for students at J C to gain knowledge and international understanding of foreign countries and their people. Later in the year, students met Meik Verworpht, an exchange student from Belgium, staying in Versailles, Missouri, who spent a week visiting J C.

"Our education system is different in that we don't choose our own classes. Boys and girls don't attend the same school nor do we eat lunch at school. We don't drive to school, because we can't get our license until we are 18."

After leaving JC, Amélie will attend one more year of school in Germany to graduate and be eligible to attend college.



### Art Club contributes to Sheltered Workshop












# COE prepares students for the future








### French Club presents Mardi Gras





## Thespians learn by doing








### Library Club sponsors State Convention

# Marcullus carries on tradition from 1912





# Quill and Scroll initiates outstanding Journalists


























### Jays succeed with wishbone






# Jays take Third in three tourneys










## Wrestlers post 10-3-1 season record






#### Golfers take district

responsibly, and willingly.



For all of these things we thank Mrs. Mock and show our respect to a lady who has gone beyond the call of duty more than once.



With this kind of an attitude from our principals it seems that the school year would have to be the best one possible.















## Tennis courts add to JC P.E. program





The Freshman Class started their high school years by getting involved in all facets of Senior High life.
























### J C remembers




Each year J C students make contributions through class competition, such as the Thanksgiving Project. In the spring a fund raising project is usually held which offers entertainment. But during the 1970-71 school year, J C students did not need any competition or entertainment, they only needed concern for a fellow student.

Cathy Hoffman lost the partial use of her leg in eighth grade. This illness was followed by a series of hospital stays and operations. During her freshman year, Cathy participated in many of the activities offered. Though she had great difficulty walking, she continued to play in the band. Her sophomore year Cathy was unable to attend school: She was almost constantly confined to her hospital bed with terminal cancer.

That year the student body rallied to her cause. \$443.82 was donated by the students out of love and concern. Students filled baskets with cards for her. Her hospital room was crowded with stuffed animals, cards, posters, and bouquets of flowers. Students who did not even know Cathy visited her. A special assembly was taped for her. A telephone was set up connecting the choir room and her hospital room. In this way, the choir was able to sing special songs to her and talk with her. On April 18, 1971, Cathy Hoffman died. But while she was alive, the student body generated a spontaneous love and concern that is very hard to match.

Two other members of the 1973 class have also died during high school. Cheryl Cooper died of injuries sustained in a car accident the summer following her sophomore year. In his senior year Jerry Spencer died in an automobile accident.

## JC holds Baccalaureate, Senior Brunch, and Commencement




