## Another Butterfly"

From 1942 to 1954 , over 15,000 Jewish children passed through Terezin, a former military garrison set up as a ghetto. It soon became a station - a stopping-off place - for hundreds of thousands on their way to the gas chambers. But, one child, Raja Englanderova, survived Terezin. I Never Saw Another Butterfly is an imaginative creation of her story, taken from documentary material, poems, diaries, drawings, and letters of the children who really lived through the horrors of Terezin.

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From House On Hobo Hill

The first account of a school in Jefferson City was taught by G. W. Miller in 1828. It was located in a small room adjoining a hotel on the East side of Madison Avenue, across the street from the present location of the Executive Mansion. The school was classified as a subscription school which meant that groups of families formed associations to educate their children. A teacher was hired for a term or a quarter which usually lasted two or three months in the winter and possibly another two or three in the spring. Board and room was often provided the teacher at the home of parents.

## First Lot Purchased For $\$ 5$

On June 8, 1835, a lot on Miller Street was purchased by the Jefferson City School District for $\$ 5$. This site was the location for the first building which was the House on Hobo Hill. This lot, which was the first public land to be purchased in Jefferson City, survived any change of ownership within the next thirty years and was to become the first site of a separate public high school building, and the site of Simonsen Junior High School. The first public school building in Jefferson City was started on the small lot about 1836. It contained two rooms and was a frame and log building. Two years later on February 19, 1838, the first school day began. The courses of instruction were reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, and grammar. The building in the upper left hand corner of the endsheet is the first schoolhouse, the house on Hobo Hill.

Public schools were started with the first distribution of state funds in 1842.

A time of major expansion started in 1870 when contracts were let out for the new school at Miller and Monroe, which was about five blocks east of the first building. This building, which is in the upper right hand corner of the endsheet, was referred to as the Central or Jefferson building. The first school term in this building opened on September 4, 1871. The term was to run ten months with 11 teachers and final entollment of 515 pupils.

## Honor Roll Established

On September 14, 1874 the first honor roll was established. It listed pupils whose total merits or their mean of standing in scholarship, punctuality and deportment was 9.8 or more for the month. By the close of this school term in 1874 the first class of three girls graduated from the Jefferson City High School. The first graduating exercises of the J,C.H.S. climaxed another series of seemingly miraculous events, similar to the starting of the system in the 1830's,

On September 1, 1878 the little school on Hohe Hill was burned to the ground. One theory in later years plames the yandalism on hoboes, which led to the name of the site as Hobo Hill. Another theory concevned the freeloaders who sat on the hillside to observe basehol pames and circuses on
the field below without buying a ticket. These observers, called hoboes, started the bleacher area to be called Hobo Hill.

## Need for Expansion

The school started to get so overcrowded that by 1897 the Board adopted plans for a three-story addition to Central or Jefferson building. There was opposition to such an addition, but support was growing for construction of a new, separate high school building. The school moved into another year without relief. Enrollment on opening day in September 1897 reached a high of 1,028 . The Board was forced into rental quarters. One-half of the 112 fifth grade students were housed in the basement of the Christian Church on Main Street, which is now Capitol Avenue. It was then announced in October that there would be half-day classes, morning for part of the students and afternoon sessions for the rest. Finally an eight-room addition was proposed for the Central or Jefferson building,

## First Yearboak

On May 6, 1912, the fiyst edition of the yearbook was published. This book consisted of 83 pages and was given the name, Marculius, by the first art editor, Henry Bacon. This was chosen to reflect the sentiment of a poem by Longfellow which had to do with the shaping of fortunes on the "flaming forge of life." It was said that the Marcullus should serve as a reminder that "our future in the Big World is, after all, only a continuance of our early life in the school world; that as we shape our thoughts and deeds now, so shall we shape them with the big hammer on the larger anvil of maturity."

The next major building shown in the left center of the endsheet was Simonsen High School. It was built in 1914. The new section was placed to the north of the original high school building on Hobo Hill. The bell tower of the older section can be seen over the roof of the new building. A donation made by Mrs. Simonsen in the memory of her husband prompted the Board of Education to name the high school in honor of Mr. Simonsen.

## New High School Features Auditorium

An outstanding feature of the new high school was the first auditorium in the school system which belped to expand music and sports. Soon after this they started a band, an orchestra, and a string ensemble. The auditorium also provided an area for the opening of the first weekly assemblies started by the principal, Mr. Beswick, during the 1914-15 school year.

Many private elubs were organized but they were not a part of the school program. One was the High School Club which was to teach boys clear speech, clean life, and clean amusement. This club was soon joined by three other clubs, organized by boys to encourage athletics.

The new auditorium made possible the first commencement exercises to be held at the high school for the class of 1915. This was the first time formal graduating ceremonies were held in a school building. This was also the first time they
used the term Junior High School as a part of the Jefferson City Public School System. It was used to apply only to classes of the eighth grade housed in the old part of the high school.

## Early Football Teams Bought Own Equipment

A high school football team was also started under the tutelage of Tom Cole. The team met opponents from high schools in Columbia, Sedalia, and Kemper. These players bought their own equipment and uniforms and were honored with membership in the J.C. Club. The more successful athletes bought black sweaters with red stripes,

About 1924 there was a search for the site of a new high school building. On September 8,1924 contracts were signed for the one-half block area fronting on Miller Street between Madison and Monroe Streets. On February 18, 1925 contracts were let out for a new three-story bigh school. The cornerstone was laid on June 24. These plans called for the first, indoor swimming pool in the school system to be located under the main floor auditorium of the new high school building.

This Senior High Junior College, which is in the middle right of the endsheet, was first occupied in 1926. With the completion of this building, the city opened its first two-year junior college course. Most of the college classes were held on the third floor of the building and the high school occupied the first and second floor. The move to the new building involved grades 10, 11, and 12 of the senior high school. The junior high grades 7,8 , and 9 were assigned to the former high school building, then renamed Simonsen Junior High School. This new school building also provided a new area for community activities.

## National Honor Society Organized

The Jefferson City Chapter of National Honor Society was established during this school year. Members were selected on the basis of scholarship, leadership, character, and service. Also during this school year there was an attempt at a hot: lunch service. By 1928 the junior high school cafeteria was in full operation.

On June 10,1929 , Hubert E. Small was hired as the first band instructor. He served on a part-time basis until he was made a full-time band instructor in the senior and junior high schools in June, 1930.

## Red \& Black Began Publication in 1930

Another highlight of the year was the first edition of the Red and Black. It was to be published every Friday. In 1934 the graduating class voted to wear gray caps and gowns at commencement. Graduates were not the only group to get new outfits that year. Mothers of band members presented the Board of Education a plan for buying uniforms for both junior and senior high school bands. The uniforms were ready by the spring of 1935 . These outfits were red capes and oyerseas caps. The band members furnished their own black trousers and white shirts to complete the outfits. Before this they had worn white slacks and shirts and sometimes letter sweaters.

## Capitol Caroling

The first capitol caroling was in 1938. This performance, which was held every year a few days before Christmas, was in the rotunda of the state capitol, and started a tradition which has continued through the years.

As time went on, many other grade schools were added which brings us up to the 1940 's. In the spring of 1945 , Joe Nichols, Jr. was hired as principal of Simonsen Junior High School. In 1958 he was elected as superintendent of the Jefferson City school system. At that time Mx. Nichols had served ten years as junior high principal and junior college dean. In years to come he was to approach a new record for tenure as superintendent.

In this same year, 1956, the Jay football team began its fantastic record. They had an undefeated season of nine games under the coaching of John Griffith and his assistants, Rex Adams and John Gnagi. When this coach left in 1957, the Board of Education selected John "Pete" Adkins of Centralia as the school's new head coach.

In July, 1957, a major decision in the history of public education was announced by the Jefferson City school directors. They were going to close the junior college program. The title of the administrative head of the senior high school and junior college had been changed from dean to principal. The official name of the junior college had also been changed to the Jefferson City Senior High School.

The next major school, the Jefferson Gity High School, which is in the lower left corner of the endsheet, was to be completed in 1964. This was the most major revision of the secondary school program since the senior high-junior college building was construeted in 1926. It was to have sixty teaching stations and 172,243 square feet of floor space.

## Nichols Career Center

There was one last major expansion in the history of the public schools, and that was the Nichols Career Centex, illustrated in the lower right corner of the endsheet. This building brought about many changes in the school. It offered a number of new vocational programs to people in the area surrounding Jefferson City.

The school district has gone through many changes through the years. It has maintained a reputation for excellence in the quality of education provided the youngsters in the Jefferson City area. From a one-room school house in 1828 to a very widely expanded system in 1976, the Jefferson City conamunity continues to educate its youth for a brighter future.
